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Bearing fruit (Gospel of Mark, 4:1-20)

As a teenager, I was strongly captivated by a passage in Mark's Gospel (4:1-20) where Jesus addresses the crowd gathered by the lake. What does he say? Although he's sitting in a boat, he's not talking about fishing, but about seeds that have fallen into the ground. Only those that have fallen into good soil produce abundant fruit.

This seed, he explained to his disciples, is the Word sown in hearts. In today's edition of the magazine, we read some wonderful examples of successful sowing even on impoverished soil.

The first example is a new centre dedicated to helping missionaries who have been through a lot. It's called Bethany Centre, and it's located in the high Maasai Mountains in Kenya. Psychotherapists are on hand to help them heal after a traumatic experience. Concerned about their environment, they also invest their energies in planting trees and helping Maasai women who have to carry their water in heavy containers.

As you read through the magazine, you'll discover the moving testimony of a young missionary who was kidnapped, and that of an older confrere to whom the Lord converted trials into consolation.

The Word of God has also found good soil in the heart of Rudy, a young Mexican who aspires to become a missionary in Africa. For the moment, he's struggling to learn French.

Missionaries of Africa's Bethany Centre in Kenya

Located in the Maasai Mountains at an altitude of 2,000 meters, some 50 kilometers from Kenya's capital Nairobi, the Bethany Centre for Missionaries of Africa has opened its doors to offer psychological care and spiritual accompaniment to missionaries, priests and religious who have lived through traumatic experiences or are facing mental health challenges such as depression, exhaustion, anxiety or addictions. Human frailty is the same for everyone!

In 2011, a favorable opportunity arose to acquire a house in Olchoro Onyore in Kenya's Maasai country. An initial team laid the foundations for this new mission. But it was not until the arrival of a team of professionals in 2022 that the house was opened for its intended mission.

A team of four confreres now oversees a range of activities including psycho-educational support, a self-growth pathway, meditation sessions and sports activities.

The team is made up of Father François Xavier Bigeziki (75) from Rwanda, a psychotherapist; Brother Patrick Norah (65) from Ghana, a spiritual guide and bursar; Father Stéphane Joulain (57) from France, a psychotherapist and clinical director of the center; and Father Sébastien Kalengwe from Congo (DRC), trained in counseling and spiritual guidance.

The team is international and intercultural. All the members of this team share the daily lives of the participants who attend the sessions. Three of these confreres have links with Canada: Father Bigeziki did part of his training in Ottawa, Father Kalengwe lived and studied in Montreal and Sherbrooke, and Father Joulain lived in Quebec City and several years in Ottawa. Today, he still teaches online at Saint Paul University in Ottawa, where he did his doctorate.

The Bethany environment

The Bethany Centre is located in an exceptional environment in the Massai mountains. However, its remote location presents a number of challenges: access to water, electricity, transport, etc. Being twelve kilometers from the tarmac road and fifteen kilometers from the nearest town, it presents major challenges during the rainy season. These inconveniences are shared by the Massai population among whom we live.

The three psychotherapists are accredited by the Kenyan Counseling and Psychological Association (KCPA). The Kenyan government recognizes their competence as psychotherapists. Brother Patrick is also a member of the Kenyan Association of Spiritual Advisors.

The centre's team is also supervised by the president of the Kenyan Rehabilitation Association of Centres. These approvals and supervisions are a guarantee of the quality of service offered to our clients. We have also built up a network of relationships with other professional centres and numerous professionals. health mental enabling us to offer the best possible service at all times.

We are also working with the national prison chaplaincy on a project to support incarcerated minors. There are three centres housing a total of almost 300 young people aged 12 to 17, but very few support services are offered to them. So, together with a permanent deacon and father of three, we're building a project to make up for this shortfall, and also to train the staff involved.

Testimony of Father Paul Sanogo

A Malian national, I was ordained a priest in Mali in July 2022 and sent on mission to Nigeria in the Diocese of Minna, more precisely to the parish of Saint-Luc in the village of Gyedna.

Terrorist attacks and looting by armed gangs are frequent. Many priests and lay people are kidnapped. This was my case for 21 days in August 2023. A young Tanzanian intern, Dominic Merikiori Mahinini, was also taken captive by bandits.

The attack took place just before midnight. After death threats, we were forced to accompany them into the forest. In fact, we had become their slaves and were regularly beaten. This went on for three weeks.

I'm enormously grateful for the care and support I've received at Bethany. It's a secluded place, but it's also a place where we can take time out and work through our traumatic experiences.

The quality of the confrères' hospitality and their skills helped me a lot. It was an extraordinary seven weeks, during which I had the chance to discover unsuspected sources of my personality. I had to deepen the scope of my emotions, my spiritual life and my interpersonal relationships. I'm full of hope. I feel renewed and ready to continue Christ's mission wherever I am sent again.

A huge thank you to Bethany Centre for giving me this time to heal and draw the positive from this kidnapping experience.



Release of Father Hans-Joachim Lohre (Ha-Jo)

Last year we invited you to pray for the release of Father Hans-Joachim Lohre, who had been kidnapped in Mali. Your prayers were answered. Ha-Jo was released on November 26, 2023 after 371 days in captivity. Fortunately, he was well treated by his al-Qaeda captors.

Father Ha-Jo thanks all those who prayed so fervently for him: «I never felt abandoned,» he says, «and I was never afraid. I know I don't owe this to my small faith, but it's thanks to you, thanks to your prayers, that the Lord has converted my trials into consolation.»

Project 74: giving Maasai women access to drinking water and promoting ecology



At an altitude of 2,000 meters, the confreres live with the Maasai population in an arid zone where drought causes a lot of loss of small livestock, and sometimes loss of life too. This year, the lack of water and the difficulty of obtaining food have taken their toll.

There are few trees. Only acacias are more resistant to strong winds. So we tried planting new species of trees. To our delight, this has helped attract a greater variety of birds.

The Maasai people live mainly from raising cows, goats and sheep. Due to recurrent droughts, this pastoral lifestyle is tending to disappearing. Younger generations are turning to more stable, sedentary professions.





The help we are requesting is to enable us to continue our tree-planting efforts using a self-sufficient water supply system.

Not only will this benefit the local population, especially women who have to carry heavy loads of water, but it will also save us the cost of buying water delivered by truck.

A native of Honduras and recently naturalized Mexican, Rudy has just completed his first stage of training to become a member of the Society of Missionaries of Africa.

He graduated with a degree in philosophy in Guadalajara, Mexico. Rudy grew up in a Mormon family (Church of Latter-day Saints). It was this family that took him in after the death of his mother. He was the youngest of three children, only three years old.

At the age of eighteen, his native country was experiencing violent political instability. In spite of himself, he had to flee his country. It was a long, arduous and dangerous journey. Hoping to reach the United States, fatigue, fear and multiple unforeseen events forced him to stay in Mexico. He found refuge in the city of San Luis Potosi.

It was there that he met a priest by the name of Margarito Sánchez Grimaldo, in charge of a shelter for immigrants. Rudy joined him in this pastoral work. He was both sacristan and driver, and looked after the upkeep of the premises.

Father Grimaldo's family adopted Rudy, where he experienced family love. This helped him integrate into Mexican society. It was there that he learned to value life and the Catholic faith.

His membership of the Catholic Church grew out of this experience of charity work. He was baptized on April 23, 2011 at the age of 21. It was one of the happiest days of his life.

Mission

His missionary call emerged during a series of vocational retreats organized by the Missionary Fathers of Guadalupe. However, it wasn't until 2018 that he really felt God's call. It was through a meeting with a Missionaries of Africa candidate that Rudy came to know the Missionaries of Africa. Their charisma, oriented towards an intercultural and multinational community lifestyle, immediately attracted him.

Since January 22, Rudy has been perfecting his French with the help of Roland Babin, a long-standing volunteer with the Missionaries of Africa who himself spent several years in Mexico with them. Learning French will enable Rudy to make the most of his year of spiritual deepening at the Samagan novitiate in Burkina Faso, starting in September 2024.
