Paul LeBlanc died recently after a long illness in Sherbrooke and went to meet his Lord whom he served faithfully as a missionary priest for 65 years in Africa, the United States and Canada. He was known to many in Toronto as he served as Pastor in the Parish of Our Lady of the Assumption for three years and in our community of Indian Road Crescent from 2000 to 2013.

I first met Paul in Tabora, Tanzania, where he worked as a curate in a parish and later served as chaplain in the Student Centre for many years. He was then chosen to serve his confreres as Assistant Provincial and then Provincial for 6 years.

I came to know him in our community of Indian Road Crescent, where we lived together for ten years. He spoke fondly of his experiences in Africa and in the Parish of Our Lady of the Assumption, where he loved the people and appreciated the cooperation of the lay people in building the parish community. He treasured the active participation of the Filipino people in the parish, particularly through the association of B.L.D. Even after he departed from the parish, he continued to accompany this association at their different weekends.

Paul was a man of community and personal prayer. He was communityminded, and always ready to help. This was expressed in a particular way as the administrator of the community which was not only a book-keeping job but involved shopping, shovelling snow, etc. He had a sense of humour when speaking of others or even himself. He was very much appreciated in our community.
