

Pilgrimage to Jerusalem, October 2022

As part of a sabbatical year, I had the opportunity to be welcomed by the White Fathers of Jerusalem and to stay in the Holy Land.

I only knew them by name. However, from the first day of my arrival, I felt like in a family that I had known for a long time. It defines itself thus, "A community: a family of 17 brothers and 14 nationalities." I would call it the *United Nations of Christianity*.

Staying in the Holy Land, the country of Jesus who seduced me and to whom I dedicated my life, is a privilege. I am amazed to learn that I am staying in the very place where Mary's parents, Anne and Joachim, lived, where the Virgin Mary was born. On the site of their house is now a sanctuary dedicated to Saint Anne and administered by the Missionaries of Africa. This place is also the place where the pool of Bethesda

was located where Jesus healed a man who had been paralyzed for 38 years (John 5, 1-15).

Archaeological excavations have uncovered two cisterns once located outside the walls.



Hundreds of pilgrims and tourists visit the place every day and always find a Missionary of Africa who welcomes them. If they wish, they can celebrate

this moment in the basilica or in the chapel of the Nativity of Mary located in the crypt, or in a small chapel inside the courtyard. This is where you can contemplate an icon of Jesus healing a paralytic and another icon **representing Joachim**, Anne and Mary, the Holy Family of Jerusalem. It is a beautiful place to share in the joy of the healed man and that of this blessed family of God.





The House (Centre Sainte-Anne) also welcomes visitors from all over the world to recharge their batteries, physically and spiritually, in order to better respond to their mission. They are mostly men and women religious or missionary priests working in Africa.

I am grateful to my bishop, Mgr. Denis Grondin, Bishop of the Archdiocese of Rimouski, who allowed me to experience this time of renewal in view of a new momentum to follow Christ.

I also thank Father Josef Buholzer, superior of the house of the Missionaries of Africa in Jerusalem, and all his confreres who welcomed me.

I offer my deepest gratitude to the whole team responsible for the Bible sessions. A person animated by the love of God awaited us on each of our visits to a significant place in the Holy Land. This added oil to our inner lamp so that after our stay it would continue to shine for a long time.

From Ouagadougou to Jerusalem

In 1995, while I was studying philosophy in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso, Father Georges Salles, Missionary of Africa, hosted a radio program on the history of the Church entitled From Jerusalem to Ouagadougou.

So, my dream was to discover this city and the Holy Land. This dream came true when I landed at Tel Aviv airport en route to Jerusalem. So *From Jerusalem to Ouagadougou* has become a reality for me!

I am Luc Kola, a member of the Society of Missionaries of Africa (White Fathers). I was ordained a priest on July 3, 2004, in Ouagadougou in Burkina Faso, my country of origin.

I arrived in Jerusalem on September 16, 2022 to participate in the Bethesda session organized by the Missionaries of Africa of the Sainte-Anne community. The session aims to help participants reread their personal life accompanied by Bible lessons in class and by various visits to Bible sites around Jerusalem.

In reality, Jerusalem is a large cosmopolitan city. It holds a central place for Jews, Christians and Muslims. The old part of the city is historically composed of four quarters: Jewish, Christian, Armenian and Muslim, where the basilica of Saint Anne is located.

I dreamed of discovering the country where Jesus physically lived two thousand years ago. But I also had great apprehension about the insecurity that arises at any time in the country. Fortunately, we were able to visit the city without any worries, even in the evenings.

The holy places are numerous; Via Dolorosa, Holy Sepulchre, Gethsemane, Mount of Olives, Jordan, Kidron Valley, Bethlehem, Bethany, Nazareth, Galilee, Mount Tabor, the Church of the Beatitudes, Lake Galilee, the Dead Sea, Capernaum and Masada, not to mention the archaeological excavations of Qumram, the Negev desert and many national parks.

Most holy places have a historical reference. Essentially, this is where Jesus was born, raised and exercised his public ministry. I realized that the holy places preserve the memory of the mystery of God in the midst of the humans that we are.

My stay in the Holy Land helps me to better know Jesus Christ and his Gospel. I lived a journey *From Jerusalem to Ouagadougou* much deeper than I could have imagined when I listened to the radio broadcasts of Father Georges Salles.

Reopening of the Afrika Center



The house of the Missionaries of Africa has housed the Afrika Centre for more than 30 years. Located at 1644, rue St-Hubert, Montreal, very close to the Berri-UQAM metro.

After several months of closure due to lack of staff and a sharp reduction in its activities caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the centre opened its doors once more on a beautiful Epiphany Saturday, January 7.

The new team welcomed more than 70 people during this reopening: recent or long-term immigrants or people studying, from several African countries, men and women religious who have worked there, neighbours and friends. Note that the newspaper *Le Montréal Africain* broadcast the event live on social networks.

The Afrika Center aspires to promote the meeting of «Africas» in their diversity, their cultural and spiritual riches. It will continue its efforts to promote the integration of Africans thus contributing to harmonious living together where diversity becomes a betterment for everyone.

During the event, the enthusiastic congregation met the new team: Rita Toutant and Monique Bonnefoy, Missionary Sisters of Our

Lady of Africa; as well as Fathers David Gnadouwa, Freddy Kyombo and Serge St-Arneault, Missionaries of Africa. The latter, director of the centre, presented the strategic plan that the new team has adopted.

Thanks to African associations and interested people, this plan will take shape in the coming months in a spirit that the team hopes to be creative and participatory. The reopening event on January 7 already had the characteristics of what the Afrika Center wants to be: a meeting space in order to share a spirit of mutual solidarity.

Three rooms are available for members. The team's dream is to develop a portal where virtual rooms will be offered. The Afrika Center continues to welcome new immigrants. It also provides convivial spaces for interreligious dialogue.

The Afrika Center is already a beautiful family and a place of universal fraternity. Its doors are open again!

Death of the Cardinal Richard Kuuia Baawobr

Appointed cardinal on May 29, 2022, Cardinal Richard Kuuia Baawobr, from Ghana, was elected two months later president of the Symposium of Episcopal Conferences of Africa and Madagascar, SECAM, during the 19th plenary assembly held in Accra, Ghana.

Unfortunately, health problems did not allow him to attend the consistory on August 27, 2022, for the creation ceremony of the cardinals. His condition subsequently deteriorated until the announcement of his death on November 27, 2022, at Agostino Gemelli Hospital in Rome.


From 2010 to 2016, Richard Kuuia Baawobr was the first African-elected

Superior General of the Missionaries of Africa.

According to the current Superior General of our Missionary Society, Father Stanley Lubungo, "As a religious family we knew how to appreciate his total commitment for the good of our Society and of the confreres. He was a charming companion and a model for our religious family. His pastoral intelligence and his commitment were recognized by all. »

This sad news affects us a lot. We hope that his departure for the house of the Father will be a source of inspiration for our religious family and for the Church in Africa.





Aged 66, our German confrere Ha-Jo Lohre, disappeared from his home in Bamako, Mali on Sunday, November 20, 2022. In the evening, his confreres noticed that his car was in the yard, but was badly parked and the door, on the driver's side, slightly open. They looked for him everywhere without finding him. The police have been notified.

The missionary was well aware of the danger he faced every day in his work: "You don't know when or where it can happen to you. As Europeans and whites, we are an easy target, and we have been told that the jihadists are watching us."

But the imminent danger did not prevent him from staying in the country. "The question given to us in the Gospel, 'Who do you say I am?' is the meaning of our life, and we see that what is important is not how long we live, or how many things we accomplish, but whether what we do have meaning and can make the world a better place."

Let us pray for Ha-Jo. May God give him strength where he is. May our Lady of Africa intercede for him and for his family.

From Nigeria, we are sharing with you a request for new solar panels presented by Erasto Shayo, a missionary from Tanzania living in Ibadan (city of 3.5 million inhabitants) in the disadvantaged district of Agbowo with multiple problems of poverty, insecurity, living in slums. A team of three White Fathers (MAfr) is at work at

the parish of Saint Thomas.

With our MAfr team, the leaders of our parish organize different activities to support human, personal and

community development. In this way, we work for the continuous training of leaders and to promote justice and peace in our neighbourhood.

We are engaged in a battle to protect the planet which is our common home. For us here, that means advocating for better public safety.

We also offer rooms to students from schools and universities so that they can study, do their homework, learn their lessons. Without electricity we cannot help them and do so safely after the sun goes down in the early evening.

But, how to have access to electricity? See the photo above. In the neighbourhood, everyone illegally connects to the network. Result: overload and almost continuous cuts!

We have two small generators that run on gasoline. In truth, not only do we not have enough money, but gas stations often run out of fuel. We had a rudimentary system of solar panels with batteries to store electricity. Moreover, lightning fell on our facilities, and we must think of a more efficient and safer installation!

Friends and benefactors of Canada, I present to you this project of approximately \$19,000 Canadian dollars. We need electricity to accomplish our mission. Yes, there are more spectacular projects in the world. But in Ibadan, Agbowo District, according to our needs, it is the purchase of solar panels and batteries. We remember that in the mission, it is sometimes necessary to "give fish" to feed the hungry. But better still, he must be "taught to fish."

Development goes through the education of young people (photos below). The young men and women in our ward will be able to do this if we provide them with well-lit and safe study rooms at night.


